Petra Kvitova (CZE #607) vs. Beatriz Haddad Maia (BRA #23) *Kvitova:*

Tied 1-1

- Two-time Wimbledon champion (2011, 2014) returned to play in February after 17 months on maternity leave
- Owns 6 career grass court titles, winning the most recent title at 2023 Berlin
- One of 3 players from Czech Republic in main draw, along with Barbora Krejcikova and Karolina Muchova
- Looking for her second match win of 2025

Haddad Maia:

- Owns 13-11 career record against players from Czech Republic, with record in 2025 standing at 0-2
- Owns 2 career grass court titles at Birmingham and Nottingham in 2022
- Only player from Brazil in the in main draw
- Today's winner will face No.3 seed Emma Navarro in 2r

Daria Kasatkina (AUS #16) v. [WC] Sonay Kartal (GBR #50) Kasatkina:

First meeting

- Owns 6 singles titles at WTA-500 events, most recently Ningbo 2024 (d. M. Andreeva in F)
- Record against opponents outside Top 20 stands at 13-9 in 2025
- Owns one singles title on grass at Eastbourne 2024 (d. Fernandez in F); also reached another two finals on grass at Birmingham 2021 (l. Jabeur in F) and Eastbourne 2023 (l. Keys in F)

Kartal:

- Seeking her first main-draw win at WTA-500 events; this marks her second career WTA 500 event, after Abu Dhabi 2025 (as qualifier, I. Volynets in 1r)
- A win today would score her career best win by ranking and second Top 20 win since defeating No.17
 Beatriz Haddad Maia at Indian Wells 2025
- Is currently ranked at a career-high No.50, recently achieved on June 9; this time last year was ranked No.271
- During last year's European Grass swing reached 3r at Wimbledon, which is her best result on grass
- Career-best result is maiden title run at Monastir 2024

- Best result at a WTA-500 event was QF run at Linz 2024 (I. eventual champion Ostapenko)
- Owns 1 win in career over Top 20 players, defeating No.4 Paula Badosa at Eastbourne 2022
- Owns 2-5 career record against players from United States of America (0-2 in 2025)
- Best career result on Grass is Runner-Up at Nottingham 2023 (I. Boulter)

CAREER MILESTONES

- After Beijing 2023 took 17 months maternity leave giving birth to Petr in July 2024. Returned to the courts at Austin 2025
- In 2023, won 30th and 31st titles at Miami (d. Rybakina in F) and Berlin (d. Vekic in F) and reached QF at Adelaide 2, Indian Wells and Ningbo
- Won title at 2022 Eastbourne (d. Ostapenko in F) and finished R-Up later that summer at Cincinnati (l. Garcia)
- Best result in 2021 was title run at Doha (d. Muguruza in F). Also made SFs at Bad Homburg and Ostrava, and QFs at Stuttgart, Madrid and Cincinnati
- Reached one final in 2020 at Doha (l. Sabalenka)
- Reached title match at 2019 Australian Open for third career Grand Slam final appearance -result moved her to World No.2, matching her career high ranking. Had she beaten Naomi Osaka in the final, would have claimed World No.1 ranking
- Also in 2019, won title at Sydney and Stuttgart and qualified for WTA Finals in Shenzhen for seventh time (went 0-3 in group play)
- Won a WTA-leading five titles in 2018, at St.
 Petersburg (d. Mladenovic in F), Doha (d.
 Muguruza in F), Prague (d. Buzarnescu in F),
 Madrid (d. Bertens in F) and Birmingham (d.
 Rybarikova in F); qualified for WTA Finals going
 0-3 in group play
- Titles in 2018 came on all three surfaces first player to win a title on three difference surfaces in a season since S.Williams in 2015
- Began 2017 season in May at Roland Garros (2r, l. Mattek-Sands) after a knife attack in her home in Czech Republic on December 20, 2016; required extensive surgery to left hand. Won title at 2017 Birmingham only a month later
- Contested Rio Olympics in August 2016, winning the singles bronze medal (l. Puig in SF, d. Keys in bronze medal play-off); also won titles at Wuhan and WTA Elite Trophy Zhuhai
- Won three titles in 2015 at Sydney, Madrid and New Haven
- Runner-up at 2015 WTA Finals in Singapore (l. A.Radwanska in 3s). Former champion at the season finale, which she won on her event debut in 2011 (d. Azarenka in F)
- Earned second Grand Slam title at 2014
 Wimbledon (d. Bouchard in F); also won title at
 New Haven and Wuhan and qualified for WTA
 Finals going 1-2 in group play
- Won two titles in 2012 at Montreal and New Haven and qualified for WTA Finals going 0-1 in group play; also won two titles in 2013 at Dubai

- Won fourth career title at 2024 Seoul, her first WTA 500 title and finished runner-up in Cleveland. Also reached quarterfinals at the 2024 US Open for best career result in New York and ended the season at No.17, her third consecutive Top 20 finish
- In doubles in 2024, won seventh career title at Adelaide (with Taylor Townsend)
- Broke into Top 10 in June 2023 after a strong clay season with SF at Roland Garros and QF at Rome and Stuttgart; ended year at No.11
- Also in 2023, won third career title at WTA Elite Trophy Zhuhai (d. Q.Zheng) and reached SF at Abu Dhabi and QF at Adelaide 2, Doha and San Diego
- In doubles, won titles at Madrid w/Victoria Azarenka (d. Gauff/Pegula) and WTA Elite Trophy Zhuhai w/Veronika Kudermetova (d. Kato/Sutjiadi)
- 2022 season highlighted by a stellar sequence of results on grass, when she became the first woman ever to win Nottingham and Birmingham back-to-back, her first career WTA titles
- Broke into the Top 20 following her run to the first WTA 1000 final at 2022 Toronto (l. Halep); also in 2022 advanced to SF at Monterrey and Eastbourne and three further QFs
- Also in 2022, won two titles at WTA 125K events in Saint Malo and Paris
- Won third doubles title at 2022 Nottingham w/Shuai Zhang (d. Dolehide/Niculescu), also reached final at Australian Open w/Anhelina Danilina (Krejcikova/Siniakova) and Guadalajara 1000 w/Danilina (l. Hunter/Stefani); earned spot at WTA Finals Fort Worth in doubles with Danilina going 1-2 in group play
- In 2021, peaked at No.80 in rankings; highlights where R16 at Indian Wells and falling 1r at Chicago 500; also played qualifying at Wimbledon and US Open and won five ITF Circuit titles in 2021
- Posted best win-by-ranking of career in 2021, defeating No.3 Karolina Pliskova during run to R16 as LL at Indian Wells. Played only on ITF Circuit in 2020 winning four titles and reaching one other final
- Highlights of 2019 were SF at Bogota and QF at Acapulco (both as qualifier); earned first Top 10 win of career over No.4 Sloane Stephens at Acapulco
- Ended 2018 at No.184, with season highlight reaching 3r at Miami (l. Ostapenko). Also made 2r at Hobart, Australian Open and Acapulco.

- and Tokyo then reached SF at WTA Finals after going 2-1 in group play
- At 2012 Sydney was two wins from becoming No.1 (had won Wimbledon and WTA Finals in previous six months)
- Won maiden Grand Slam title at 2011 Wimbledon (d. Sharapova in F); also won titles in 2011 at Brisbane, Paris [Indoor], Madrid and Linz
- Was first player born in 1990s to win a Grand Slam title at 2011 Wimbledon
- Entered Top 10 on May 16, 2011; qualified for and won WTA Finals in 2011 (d. Azarenka in F) Reached SF at 2010 Wimbledon
- Won first career title at 2009 Hobart (d. Benesova in F) and reached final at Linz (l. Wickmayer)
- Earned first WTA main draw win at 2008 Paris [Indoor] defeating No.30 Anabel Medina Garrigues and reached first QFs at Budapest and Zurich propelling her into Top 50 for the first time ending year at No.44
- Earned first Top 10 win of career over No.8 Venus Williams while ranked No.143 at 2008 February
- Made WTA debut at 2007 Prague qualifying and main draw debut at 2007 Stockholm; also played US Open qualifying that year Member of Czech Republic's Billie Jean King Cup winning team in 2011-12, 2014-16 and 2018
- Made professional debut on ITF Circuit in Czech Republic in 2006; owns seven ITF titles

- Posted first Top 100 season in 2017, finishing at No.65
- Broke into Top 100 following first Grand Slam main draw appearance at 2017 Roland Garros, earning spot as a qualifier Reached first WTA singles final at 2017 Seoul while ranked No.71 (l. No.10 Ostapenko)
- Other 2017 highlights include QF at Prague (as qualifier) and first Grand Slam main draw win at Wimbledon; defeated No.19 Sam Stosur en route to Prague QF, the first Top 20 win of career
- In doubles, won second title at Bogota w/Nadia Podoroska (d. Cepede Royg/Linette)
- Played three WTA main draws in 2016 at Rio de Janeiro, Miami and Florianopolis falling in 1r in each appearance; also played qualifying at Roland Garros and US Open
- In 2015, reached first QF of career at Rio de Janeiro while ranked No.234 losing to No.16 Sara Errani, the first Top 20 match of career; result propelled her into Top 200 for first time in career
- Also in 2015, reached 2r at Bogota and played qualifying at Charleston, Roland Garros, Nottingham and Wimbledon
- Won first WTA doubles title at 2015 Bogota w/Paula Cristina Goncalves (d. Falconi/Rogers)
- In July 2015, suffered a shoulder injury at the Pan American Games in Toronto, was forced to have surgery and miss remainder of season
- Played two WTA events in 2014 at Rio de Janeiro and Florianopolis; falling in 1r at both events as a WC
- Won first WTA match at 2013 Florianopolis as WC (d. Hsu, l. Czink)
- Made WTA qualifying debut at 2012 Québec City (l. El Tabakh)
- Owns 17 ITF Circuit singles titles; made professional debut on ITF circuit in 2010

- Coached by Jiri Vanek; fitness trainer is Ivan Trebaticky and physio/trainer is Florian Zitzelsberger; trains at TK Sparta Praha
- Father is Jiri (vice mayor); mother is Pavla; brothers are Jiri (engineer) and Libor (teacher). Introduced to tennis by father
- Favorite type of movie is comedy. Favorite types of music are pop, rock. Favorite foods are sushi, Italian. Also enjoys basketball and volleyball
- Favorite city to visit is Melbourne; favorite tournament is Wimbledon

- Started 2024 season by reaching QF (l. Keys) at Eastbourne, her first event since US Open 2023. Reached two finals at Beijing (l. Gauff in F) and Palermo (l. Zheng in F). Made consecutive SF at US Open (l. Pegula) and reached another SF at Ningbo (l. M. Andreeva, retired in 2nd set).
