[Q] Ajla Tomljanovic (AUS #64) vs. Katie Boulter (GBR #34)

Tied 1-1

Tomljanovic:

- Best result at a WTA-500 event was a Runner-Up finish at Seoul 2018 (l. No. 12 Kiki Bertens in F)
- Last win over a Top 50 opponent came at Charleston 2025 (def. No.43 Peyton Stearns)
- Won lone meeting on grass against Boulter at Nottingham 2022
- Is currently ranked No.64; this time last year was ranked No.189

Boulter:

- Owns one title at a WTA-500 event: San Diego 2024
- Best career results on grass were a pair of Champion runs at Nottingham in 2024 and 2023
- Has won her last four matches when playing against player from Australia. Overall, is 5-2 versus opponents from Australia and is 2-2 on grass
- Winner of today will face [5] Diana Shnaider or Magdalena Frech in the 2r

[WC] Emma Raducanu (GBR #37) vs. [Q] Cristina Bucsa (ESP #112)

Bucsa leads 1-0

Raducanu:

- Best career result at a WTA-500 event was a QF run at Seoul in 2022
- Holds a career record of 17-7 against players ranked outside the Top 100. Is 3-2 in such matches on grass
- Has advanced to the Round of 16-or-better in her last three tournaments on grass (Wimbledon 2024 - R16, Eastbourne 2024 - QF, Nottingham 2024 - SF)
- Is currently ranked No.37; this time last year was ranked No.209
- Winner of today will face Rebecca Sramkova or [7] Barbora Krejickova

Bucsa:

- Best career result at a WTA-500 event was a QF run at Abu Dhabi in 2024 (l. No.5 Elena Rybakina)
- Holds a 1-0 record against Raducanu winning their lone meeting at Singapore 2025
- Owns nine wins in career over Top 50 players, most recently No.18 Anna Kalinskaya at Doha 2025. Looking for first Top 50 win on grass
- Is 4-0 in matches against players from United Kingdom with all four wins either coming on hard court or clay

Rebecca Sramkova (SVK #41) vs. [7] Barbora Krejčíková (CZE #17)

Sramkova:

- Best career result at a WTA-500 event was a QF run at Mérida 2025
- Owns four wins in career over Top 20 players, most recently No.17 Beatriz Haddad Maia at Mérida 2025
- Holds a 2-0 career Tour-level record against players from Czech Republic (d. No.18 Karolina Muchova at Warsaw 2023 and d. No.12 Petra Kvitova at Prague 2021)
- This is her second career Tour-level tournament on grass after appearing in the 1r at Wimbledon 2024
- Is currently ranked No.41; this time last year was ranked No.112

Krejčíková:

- Playing in third main draw of 2025 having lost in opening round at Strasbourg and second round at Roland Garros
- Holds three titles at WTA-500 events: San Diego 2023, Ostrava 2022 and Strasbourg 2021
- Seeking first Top 50 win of the season, most recently defeated No.3 Coco Gauff at WTA Finals 2024
- Won most recent head-to-head against Sramkova at ITF Torun in 2018. Fell to Sramkova at ITF Trnava 2 in 2016
- Best career result on grass is a Champion run at Wimbledon in 2024 (d. No.7 Jasmine Paolini in F)
- Winner of today will face either [WC] Emma Raducanu or [Q] Cristina Bucsa

CAREER MILESTONES

- Highlight of 2024 season was reaching the final at Birmingham and earning WTA 125 title at Hong Kong
- Began the 2023 season in August after undergoing minor knee surgery in January. Pulled out of her 2r match at US Open before ending the season on a high note winning Florianopolis WTA 125 (d. Capurro Taborda).
- Best performances of 2022 produced at Wimbledon and US Open with QF. Also reached QF at Istanbul, Rabat, Nottingham and Cincinnati.
- Produced Grand Slam breakthrough at 2021 Wimbledon, advancing to QF (l. eventual champion Barty)
- Other singles highlights last season were runs to R16 at Indian Wells and 3r at both US Open and Charleston
- Equaled best result at home Slam by advancing to 2r at 2020 Australian Open (l. Muguruza)
- Ended 2019 season by representing Australia in Perth final of Billie Jean King Cup vs. France - went 1-1 in singles (d. Parmentier, l. Mladenovic) as visitors prevailed 3-2
- Posted career-high ranking of No.39 on April 1, 2019 (following 3r run at Miami 3r)
- Four-time WTA singles finalist, most recently finishing runner-up at 2019 Hua Hin (l. Yastremska). Earlier finals came at 2015 Pattaya City (l. Hantuchova), 2018 Rabat (l. Mertens) and 2018 Seoul (l. Bertens)
- Posted two Top 10 wins in 2019, her first for almost five years, defeating No.10 Sabalenka (Miami) and No.8 Bertens (Zhengzhou). Other Top 10 defeat, and best win of career, came over No.3 A.Radwanska at 2014 Roland Garros
- Reached first Premier-level SF of career at 2019 Zhengzhou (l. eventual champion Ka.Pliskova)
- Underwent shoulder surgery in February 2016 and was sidelined for rest of season; returned at 2017 Acapulco, more than 12 months later
- Made Top 50 debut in 2015, rising as high as No.47 (week of February 23)
- Best Grand Slam result to date is R16 run at 2014 Roland Garros (d. No.32 seed Vesnina in 2r and No.3 seed A.Radwanska in 3r, l. Suarez Navarro)
- Announced in 2014 she would switch nationalities and start representing Australia (first did so at 2014 US Open)
- On ITF Circuit, winner of four singles titles and three doubles titles
- Made pro debut on ITF Circuit in Croatia in 2007 and WTA main draw debut at 2009 Indian Wells
- 2024 season saw Boulter rise to a career high ranking of No.23, achieved on Nov 4, 2024. Successfully defended title at Nottingham (d. Ka. Pliskova in F) and won San Diego (d. Kostyuk in F). Made SF at Tokyo (l. Kenin) and wrapped up the year with a final run at Hong Kong (l. champion Shnaider).
- In 2023 captured first WTA singles title of career on home soil at Nottingham; made Top 50 debut at No.50 the week of September 11; advanced to 3r at Wimbledon for second year in a row (l. Rybakina), and at US Open for first time (l. Stearns).
- Also in 2023, reached 2r as qualifier at both Montreal and Beijing; on ITF Circuit won one singles title at Canberra and reached two finals in Japan; went 2-0 in singles in November s Billie Jean King Cup play-offs against Sweden
- During the 2022 grass court season, advanced to QF at Nottingham (ret. vs. Davis w/right elbow injury) and 2r at Wimbledon (l. Sabalenka)
- Opened 2021 season by reaching 3r at the Gippsland Trophy in Melbourne (l. Osaka); upset No.14 seed Gauff in 2r
- Ended 2020 by finishing R-Up at \$15k ITF/Sharm El-Sheikh-EGY. Earlier in the year, made 2r at Acapulco (l. Zhu) and fell 1r at Australian Open (l. Svitolina) in only Tour-level outings
- Suffered a stress fracture in her back which forced her out for much of 2019. Best results prior to injury were 2r showing at Australian Open and SF run at \$25K ITF/Solapur-IND (l. Raina)
- Won the WTA's first-ever 10-point match tie-break at a Slam to see off Makarova in 1r at 2019 Australian Open
- Reached career-high No.82 on February 18, 2019
- Broke into the Top 100 the week of October 15, 2018
- Made significant strides in 2018, reaching first WTA QF of career at Nottingham (l. eventual champion Barty) - defeated Stosur en route for her first win over a Grand Slam winner. Also enjoyed QF run at Tianjin (d. No.432 Sakkari, l. Ka.Pliskova) and R-Up finish at \$100K ITF/Southsea-GBR (l. Flipkens)
- Also in 2018, reached 2r for the first time at a major, at Wimbledon (d. Cepede Royg, l. Osaka)
- Part of Great Britain Fed Cup Team, 2018-19
- Fell 1r on tour level main draw singles debut at 2017 Wimbledon (as WC, l. McHale)
- On ITF Circuit, winner of six singles titles and four doubles titles

- (as WC, l. 1r)
- As a junior, achieved career-high ranking of No.4, won Australian Open junior doubles title in 2009 (w/McHale), and was a member of Croatia's victorious junior Fed Cup team in 2009

- Played first professional events of career on ITF Circuit in Britain in 2011
- Appeared in girls' singles at all four Slams, reaching 3r at Australian Open, Wimbledon and US Open, and was R-Up in doubles at 2014 Australian Open (w/Jorovic, l. Kalinina/Kulichkova). Other junior highlights include winning Lemon Bowl in Rome at age of 11, and reaching final at Junior Orange Bowl in Florida at age 14

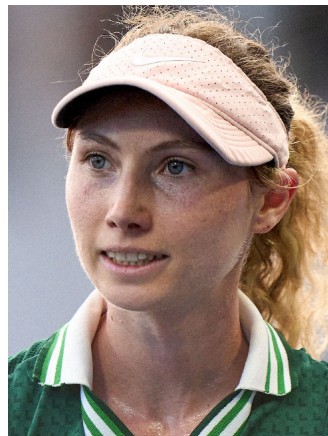

CAREER MILESTONES

- Returned to the courts in 2024 winning opening round matches at Auckland, Australian Open and Abu Dhabi. Went on to reach semifinals at Nottingham, as well as quarterfinals at Stuttgart, Eastbourne, Washington and Seoul. Achieved her first career Top 10 wins over No.5 Jessica Pegula at Eastbourne and No.9 Maria Sakkari at Wimbledon
- In 2023 made fourth round of Indian Wells (l. Swiatek) before falling in opening rounds at Miami and Stuttgart. Ended her season after Stuttgart and took time away to undergo minor surgery on both hands and ankle in May 2023.
- Struggled with injuries and form throughout 2022 dropping as low as No.83 after 1r exit at US Open
- Best performance came late in the year with SF run in Seoul (l. Ostapenko via ret. w/left glute injury). Also made QF at Stuttgart (l. eventual champion Swiatek) and Washington DC (l. eventual champion Samsonova) with best win-by-ranking coming over No.22 Azarenka during 3r run at Cincinnati
- Earned a career best year in 2021 jumping over 300 ranking spots and finishing the season inside the Top 20 at a career high of No.19 earning her the 2021 WTA Newcomer of the Year Award
