## MATCH NOTES – DAY 3 – WEDNESDAY, JUNE 11

### [3] Emma Navarro (USA #10) vs. Beatriz Haddad Maia (BRA #22)

**Haddad Maia leads 3-2**

*Navarro:*

- Looking to reach sixth quarterfinal of the year
- Reached two quarterfinals on grass last year including at Wimbledon, her first time advancing to the final eight at a Grand Slam
- Best career result on grass were semifinal runs at Bad Homburg in 2023 and 2024
- One of four players from United States to reach second round

*Haddad Maia:*

- Beat two-time Wimbledon champion, Petra Kvitová, in first round
- Owns 12 wins in career over Top 10 players and is 1-0 this year beating today's opponent at Strasbourg
- Two of her four career titles have come on grass at 2022 Birmingham and Nottingham
- Looking to reach just second quarterfinal of the year

### Sonay Kartal (GBR #50) vs. [8] Amanda Anisimova (USA #15)

**First meeting**

*Kartal:*

- Beat No.16 Daria Kasatkina in opening round for best win by-ranking of career and second career Top 20 win
- Looking to reach first WTA 500 quarterfinal of career with a win today
- Has reached one previous Tour-level quarterfinal winning maiden WTA title at Monastir last year
- Win in first round here was only third career Tour-level grass win after reaching third round at Wimbledon 2024
- Is currently at a career high ranking of No.50; this time last year was ranked No.271

*Anisimova:*

- Beat another British wildcard Jodie Burrage in her opening round, was first career win over a British player, now holds 1-2 record
- Looking to reach fourth quarterfinal of the year
- Best career result on grass were four previous quarterfinal runs, most recently at 2022 Wimbledon
- Is currently ranked at a career high of No.15

**Anastasia Zakharova (#111) vs. [2] Madison Keys (USA #5)**

**First meeting**

***Zakharova:***

- Playing in 14th Tour-level main draw with her best result being a QF run at 2024 Hong Kong 250
- Competing in first Tour-level main draw at a grass-court event
- At No.5, Keys is the highest ranked opponent she has faced
- Previous career-high ranking is No.106; by reaching main draw via qualifying is projected to make Top 100 debut after tournament, climbing as high as No.90

***Keys:***

- Has won three grass-court titles – 2014 Eastbourne, 2016 Birmingham and 2023 Eastbourne
- Among active players, only Petra Kvitová (6) has won more grass-court titles than Keys
- Seeking ninth career grass-court quarterfinal appearance
- Has won 48 career matches on grass at Tour-level main draws

## CAREER MILESTONES

- Voted 2024 WTA Most Improved Player of the Year Award, finished the year ranked No.8 with a singles record of 54-24, winning her first career title at 2024 Hobart; climbed to a year-end ranking at No.8 after finishing 2023 at No.38 (and No.143 in 2022)
- 2023 was a stand-out year, achieving a career best with semifinal at WTA 500 San Diego (L. Kenin) and ending season with a ranking of No. 32. Also reached two quarterfinals on clay; Strasbourg (L. Blinkova) and Palermo (L. eventual champion Zheng) and one semifinal on grass; Bad Homburg (L. Siniakova).
- In 2022, posted 31-18 win-loss record. At Tour-level, made 2r at Charleston (as WC, L. Jabeur), fell 1r at Monterrey (as WC, L. Zacarias) and Indian Wells (as WC, L. Anisimova), and contested qualifying at San Diego
- Elsewhere in 2022, reached three ITF Circuit finals, including lifting second career title at this level at W60 tournament in Liepaja, Latvia, while made SF at WTA 125K Series event in Vancouver
- Broke into Top 200 for the first time on March 7, 2022
- Lifted maiden ITF Circuit title at W25 event in Orlando in November 2021
- Won the NCAA division 1 women's singles title in May 2021 to earn a WC into US Open, where she fell 1r (L. McHale)
- In 2021, reached 2r at both Charleston [500] and Charleston [250]
- Fell 1r at 2020 Monterrey (L. Stephens)
- Only other events in 2020 came on ITF Circuit, ending year ranked No.463
- Owns three ITF Circuit titles in singles and one in doubles
- Fell 2r on professional debut at \$10k Charleston, SC-USA (L. Di Lorenzo) in 2015
- Began her collegiate career by winning her first 14 NCAA singles matches and moving up to a No.6 ITA ranking
- Ended 2019 at No.3 in ITF Junior rankings, following a season that included a R-Up finish at Roland Garros (L. Fernandez), a SF run at Wimbledon and victory at the Adidas Easter Bowl
- Also R-Up in girls' doubles at 2019 Australian Open w/Beck
- Won fourth career title at 2024 Seoul, her first WTA 500 title and finished runner-up in Cleveland. Also reached quarterfinals at the 2024 US Open for best career result in New York and ended the season at No.17, her third consecutive Top 20 finish
- In doubles in 2024, won seventh career title at Adelaide (with Taylor Townsend)
- Broke into Top 10 in June 2023 after a strong clay season with SF at Roland Garros and QF at Rome and Stuttgart; ended year at No.11
- Also in 2023, won third career title at WTA Elite Trophy Zhuhai (d. Q.Zheng) and reached SF at Abu Dhabi and QF at Adelaide 2, Doha and San Diego
- In doubles, won titles at Madrid w/Victoria Azarenka (d. Gauff/Pegula) and WTA Elite Trophy Zhuhai w/Veronika Kudermetova (d. Kato/Sutjiadi)
- 2022 season highlighted by a stellar sequence of results on grass, when she became the first woman ever to win Nottingham and Birmingham back-to-back, her first career WTA titles
- Broke into the Top 20 following her run to the first WTA 1000 final at 2022 Toronto (L. Halep); also in 2022 advanced to SF at Monterrey and Eastbourne and three further QFs
- Also in 2022, won two titles at WTA 125K events in Saint Malo and Paris
- Won third doubles title at 2022 Nottingham w/Shuai Zhang (d. Dolehide/Niculescu), also reached final at Australian Open w/Anhelina Danilina (Krejčíková/Siniakova) and Guadalajara 1000 w/Danilina (L. Hunter/Stefani); earned spot at WTA Finals Fort Worth in doubles with Danilina going 1-2 in group play
- In 2021, peaked at No.80 in rankings; highlights where R16 at Indian Wells and falling 1r at Chicago 500; also played qualifying at Wimbledon and US Open and won five ITF Circuit titles in 2021
- Posted best win-by-ranking of career in 2021, defeating No.3 Karolina Pliskova during run to R16 as LL at Indian Wells. Played only on ITF Circuit in 2020 winning four titles and reaching one other final
- Highlights of 2019 were SF at Bogota and QF at Acapulco (both as qualifier); earned first Top 10 win of career over No.4 Sloane Stephens at Acapulco
- Ended 2018 at No.184, with season highlight reaching 3r at Miami (L. Ostapenko). Also made 2r at Hobart, Australian Open and Acapulco.



- Posted first Top 100 season in 2017, finishing at No.65
- Broke into Top 100 following first Grand Slam main draw appearance at 2017 Roland Garros, earning spot as a qualifier Reached first WTA singles final at 2017 Seoul while ranked No.71 (l. No.10 Ostapenko)
- Other 2017 highlights include QF at Prague (as qualifier) and first Grand Slam main draw win at Wimbledon; defeated No.19 Sam Stosur en route to Prague QF, the first Top 20 win of career
- In doubles, won second title at Bogota w/Nadia Podoroska (d. Cepede Royg/Linette)
- Played three WTA main draws in 2016 at Rio de Janeiro, Miami and Florianopolis falling in 1r in each appearance; also played qualifying at Roland Garros and US Open
- In 2015, reached first QF of career at Rio de Janeiro while ranked No.234 losing to No.16 Sara Errani, the first Top 20 match of career; result propelled her into Top 200 for first time in career
- Also in 2015, reached 2r at Bogota and played qualifying at Charleston, Roland Garros, Nottingham and Wimbledon
- Won first WTA doubles title at 2015 Bogota w/Paula Cristina Goncalves (d. Falconi/Rogers)
- In July 2015, suffered a shoulder injury at the Pan American Games in Toronto, was forced to have surgery and miss remainder of season
- Played two WTA events in 2014 at Rio de Janeiro and Florianopolis; falling in 1r at both events as a WC
- Won first WTA match at 2013 Florianopolis as WC (d. Hsu, l. Czink)

## CAREER MILESTONES

- Breakthrough year in 2024 saw her win first title at Monastir and reach 3r at Wimbledon as a qualifier. Her ranking entered the Top 100 for the first time and peaked at No.85 by year-end.

In 2023 reached main draw at Nottingham as a qualifier
