HSBC CHAMPIONSHIPS TALKING POINTS

- World No. 2 and 2023 champion **Carlos Alcaraz** returns to **HSBC Championships** in his first tournament since lifting his 5th Grand Slam title at Roland Garros. The only former champion in this year's field is on a 13-match winning streak and leads the ATP Tour in wins (37) and titles (4) this season. In his last stop before attempting to three-peat at Wimbledon, Alcaraz seeks 4th grass title in his last 5 events played on the surface.
- 23-year-old **Jack Draper** is the first British Top-2 seed at Queen's Club since No. 1 Murray in 2017 and leads 5 home players in the field this year. Last year, he defeated No. 2 Alcaraz in second round for biggest win of his career and now aims to join 5-time champion Murray as only Brits to lift the men's singles title at this event in Open Era. 23-year-old is 25-7 this season, highlighted by 1st ATP Masters 1000 title in Indian Wells.
- Former World No. 8 and 2021 finalist **Cameron Norrie** is one of three British wildcards, joined by **Daniel Evans** and **Billy Harris**. Three Brits will begin their event on Day 1 with Norrie and Evans both facing Top 20 opponents. Norrie, who seeks 2nd Top 20 win of 2025 after defeating No. 11 Medvedev in Roland Garros 1R, meets No. 17 **Jakub Mensik**. Evans, who looks for 2nd career Top 20 win on grass (1-10, d. No. 16 Basilashvili at 2019 Wimbledon), takes on No. 13 **Frances Tiafoe** in their tenth tour-level meeting (3-6).
- There are five Top 10 players in this year's draw, most since 2017, with World No. 4 **Taylor Fritz** arriving to London on a 4-match winning streak after capturing Stuttgart title on Sunday without dropping serve all tournament. No. 9 **Holger Rune** looks for second ATP 500 title after win in Barcelona in April earlier this year, while No. 10 **Ben Shelton** plays in his first event as a Top-10 player after making his debut on Monday.
- Tommy Paul** defeated **Lorenzo Musetti** in last year's final to win the biggest title of his career. This year, both were forced to withdraw due to injuries as Paul pulled out due to abdominal injury and Musetti due to leg injury. 2021 and 2022 champion **Matteo Berrettini** was set to return for the first time since winning the title, but withdrew due to ongoing abdominal injury that also forced him to skip Roland Garros earlier this month.

Evans claimed the first set with a 44% Steal Score and a Return Quality of 7.4, successfully returning 70% of his first serves. However, in the second and third sets, Tiafoe's Conversion rate soared to 77%, reducing Evans' Steal Score to just 23%. Tiafoe's serve was formidable, achieving a Serve Quality score of 9.0, while Evans managed to return 50% of his first serves across these sets.

Frances Tiafoe | Age: 27 | World No. 13 | Career-High No. 10 | 2025: 17-13 (Houston F) | Queen's: 5-6 ('18, '21 QF)
 > Former World No. 2 junior achieved career-high No. 10 in June 2023 after lifting 3rd title in Stuttgart, saving 1 MP vs. Struff in the final to own ATP Tour titles on all three surfaces.
 > Joined Fritz in Top 10 to be 1st American duo in Top 10 of PIF ATP Rankings since Fish and Isner in May 2012.
 > Defeated 4-time champion Nadal en route to 2022 US Open SF, becoming that event's 1st American men's semi-finalist since Roddick in 2006 and returned to US Open SF in 2024, losing to Fritz in all-American match.
 > Led Team World to 2022 Laver Cup title, teaming w/Sock to defeat Federer/Nadal in Swiss' final match before clinching cup with win over Tsitsipas.
 > Rallied from 3-5 in third set and saved 2 MPs vs. Rune to reach 1st ATP Masters 1000 final at 2024 Cincinnati.
 > Won 1st ATP Tour title as 20-year-old at 2018 Delray Beach and remains youngest American champion since Roddick, 19, at 2002 Houston and 2nd ATP Tour title at 2023 Houston.
 > Parents emigrated from Sierra Leone in 1996 and father was Head of Maintenance at Junior Tennis Champions Center in Maryland, where Frances and his twin brother Franklin trained as kids.

NOTE: Tiafoe is making his 7th consecutive appearance at the event (since 2018; also in 2016-17 Q) and is 11-2 in opening rounds this season. This is his most frequent match-up on tour-level (previously 9 vs. Evans and Zverev) and plays in first match on grass since losing to eventual champion Alcaraz in Wimbledon 3R in five sets (led 2 sets to 1).

Daniel Evans | Age: 35 | World No. 199 | Career-High No. 21 | 2025: 1-2 ('s-Hertogenbosch 2R) | Queen's: 5-10 (2021 QF)
 > Former Top-10 junior was unranked in April 2018 before becoming No. 1 Brit for 1st time in October 2019 and achieving career-high No. 21 in August 2023 after winning 2nd ATP Tour title at Washington.
 > Did not drop a set en route to 1st ATP Tour title as a 30-year-old at 2021 Melbourne-2.
 > Rallied from 2 sets down and won 5th-set TB vs. Popyrin to reach 2nd Grand Slam 4R of career at 2021 US Open, then beat Khachanov in 2024 US Open 1R in longest match in tournament history (5H 35M).
 > Reached ATP Masters 1000 SFs at 2021 Monte Carlo (d. No. 1 Djokovic in 3R) and 2022 Montreal.

- > Advanced to ATP Masters 1000 doubles finals at 2021 Miami w/N. Skupski, 2021 Monte Carlo w/N. Skupski and 2022 Montreal w/Peers.
- > Fell outside Top 100 after opting not to defend Washington title to play Paris Olympics doubles w/A. Murray in former World No. 1's final event, saving 5 MPs in 1R and 2 MPs in 2R to reach quarter-finals.

NOTE: Evans looks for his first win at Queen's Club since defeating Mannarino to reach 2021 QF and plays in his 11th main draw at the event, making his debut in 2008 as No. 988-ranked WC (l. to Malisse). 35-year-old is 26-60 vs. Top 20 (1-10 on grass), seeking first win since defeating No. 12 de Minaur in 2023 Davis Cup (0-10 since).

In last year's Paris match, Rune's aggressive play proved decisive against Arnaldi, with a 32% to 22% advantage in attack. Both players exceeded the Tour average of 69% in conversion, yet Rune's edge was evident as he won 16 of his 19 net points. Despite Arnaldi's superior baseline play, highlighted by a forehand quality score of 8.1 compared to Rune's 6.1, it wasn't enough to secure victory.

Holger Rune | Age: 22 | World No. 9 | Career-High No. 4 | 2025: 20-12 (Barcelona Title) | Queen's: 3-2 (2023 SF)

- > Former World No. 1 junior broke into Top 100 in January 2022, Top 50 in May 2022 and Top 10 in November 2022, becoming highest-ranked Dane in PIF ATP Rankings history (since 1973), peaking at No. 4 in August 2023.
- > Captured 2022 ATP Masters 1000 Paris title at age 19 by becoming 1st player since start of ATP Tour in 1990 to earn 5 Top-10 wins at an event other than Nitto ATP Finals.
- > From 2022 Paris to 2023 Rome, compiled an 18-5 record in 6 ATP Masters 1000 events, also posting runner-up results in Monte-Carlo and Rome.
- > Went on a 7-match winning streak vs. Top 5 opponents for 7-1 start to career vs. Top 5 (now 8-14), including wins over No. 1 Alcaraz at 2022 ATP Masters 1000 Paris and No. 1 Djokovic at 2023 ATP Masters 1000 Rome.
- > Ended 2022 season on 19-2 run (2-2 in finals) after going 1-6 from January-February and 0-7 from June-July.
- > Upset 2021 finalist Tsitsipas at 2022 Roland Garros to become 1st Danish man to reach QF in tournament history (since 1925) and to reach any Grand Slam QF in Open Era (since 1968).

NOTE: Rune is 9-1 vs. players ranked outside Top 20 on grass since the start of 2023 season, lone loss to No. 43 Thompson in Queen's Club 1R last year. He is 10-7 on tour-level grass, highlighted by going 7-2 in 2023, reaching Queen's Club SF (l. to de Minaur) and Wimbledon QF (l. to eventual champion Alcaraz).

Matteo Arnaldi | Age: 24 | World No. 41 | Career-High No. 30 | 2025: 15-14 (Delray Beach SF) | Queen's: 1-1 ('24 2R)

- > Broke into Top 500 in September 2021, Top 200 in August 2022 and Top 100 in May 2023, achieving career-high No. 30 in August 2024 after advancing to 1st ATP Masters 1000 SF in Montreal.
- > Reached 1st ATP Tour QF and SF at 2023 Umag and 1st Grand Slam 4R at 2023 US Open.
- > At ATP Masters 1000 Madrid, defeated No. 4 Ruud to reach 3R in 2023 and No. 5 Djokovic en route to 2025 QF.
- > Owns 59-39 Challenger record (4-2 in finals), highlighted by 1st title on home soil at Francavilla al Mare.
- > Peaked at No. 22 in juniors, posting 80-42 singles record (3 titles) and 34-35 doubles record (2 titles).

NOTE: Arnaldi is 5-14 vs. Top 10, including 2-3 this season after wins over No. 8 Rublev in Indian Wells 2R and No. 5 Djokovic in Madrid 2R and attempts to be first man to earn Top 10 wins on all 3 surfaces this season. He is 1-4 on grass on tour-level, saving 1 match point to defeat No. 16 Humbert in Queen's Club 1R last year.

[WC] Cameron Norrie (GBR) vs [8] Jakub Mensik (CZE)

First Meeting

Cameron Norrie | Age: 29 | World No. 61 | Career-High No. 8 | 2025: 16-13 (Geneva SF) | Queen's: 6-7 (2021 Final)
 > Broke into Top 10 in April 2022 and achieved career-high No. 8 in September 2022, joining Henman, Murray and Rusedski as 4th Top-10 British man in history.
 > Advanced to 13 ATP Tour finals from May 2021-February 2023, highlighted by 2021 ATP Masters 1000 Indian Wells title to become 1st British champion in 46-year tournament history.
 > Reached Grand Slam 4R, QF and SF for 1st time at 2022 Wimbledon, falling to eventual champion Djokovic in 4 sets.
 > Earned 52 wins in 2021 and 49 wins in 2022 before beating No. 2 Nadal at 2023 United Cup and No. 2 Alcaraz in 2023 Rio de Janeiro final for biggest wins of career.
 > Born in South Africa to a Scottish father and Welsh mother, grew up in New Zealand, became No. 1 collegiate player in USA at Texas Christian University, and has represented Great Britain since 2013.

NOTE: Norrie is making his 8th consecutive main draw appearance at Queen's Club, earning 4 wins en route to 2021 final (l. to Berrettini) and 2 wins to reach 2023 QF (l. to Korda). He seeks 2nd Top 20 win on grass of career (1-8) after defeating No. 14 Shapovalov in 2021 SF at this venue and remains the most recent British finalist at Queen's Club.

Jakub Mensik | Age: 19 | World No. 17 (Career-High) | 2025: 20-10 (Miami Title) | Queen's: 0-0 (Debut)
 > Former World No. 2 junior broke into Top 100 in February 2025 and earned career-high No. 17 in June 2025 soon after becoming fourth man in series history to win 1st title at ATP Masters 1000 event in Miami.
 > Also in Miami, defeated No. 4 Fritz and 6-time champion No. 5 Djokovic to join Alcaraz as only teenagers to earn multiple Top 5 wins in one event this century and became 1st Czech ATP Masters 1000 champion since 2005.
 > Reached 1st ATP Tour QF, SF and final at 2024 Doha by defeating former champions Murray, No. 5 Rublev and Monfils, becoming 1st man born in 2005 or later to play in an ATP Tour final.
 > In tour-level debut, reached 3R at 2023 US Open as Q, becoming youngest man to reach Grand Slam 3R since Nadal at 2004 Aus. Open and youngest at US Open since Santoro in 1990, losing to Fritz on 18th birthday.
 > Also advanced to Grand Slam 3R at 2024 US Open, losing to Borges after holding 3 MPs and 2025 Australian Open, losing to Davidovich Fokina after squandering 2 MPs.
 > Posted 85-28 record on ITF Juniors circuit, highlighted by reaching 2022 Australian Open boys' singles final.

NOTE: Mensik bids to be second teenager to record a main draw win at Queen's Club this decade, joining Draper, 19, in 2021 (d. Sinner, Bublik). Czech No. 1 earned both ATP Tour wins on grass en route to Mallorca QF last year and owns 4-0 record vs. left-handers this season, but went 0-3 against them on grass last year.

Jacob Fearnley (GBR) vs [Q] Alex Bolt (AUS)

First Meeting
