HSBC CHAMPIONSHIPS TALKING POINTS

- World No. 2 **Carlos Alcaraz** takes on countryman **Roberto Bautista Agut**, as 22-year-old aims to advance to five consecutive finals for the first time in career. Alcaraz is 25-1 since April, lone loss to Rune in Barcelona final, who lost in QF to Bautista Agut. Alcaraz, who leads the ATP Tour in wins (41), titles (4) and finals (5) this season, also attempts to record 250th tour-level win of career (249-61) and extend his 14-0 record vs. countrymen since losing to Nadal in 2022 ATP Masters 1000 Indian Wells SF.
- Bautista Agut** aims to advance to his 24th ATP Tour final, third above ATP 250 level after 2016 ATP Masters 1000 Shanghai and 2018 Dubai. After defeating No. 9 Rune in QF, he aims to record multiple Top 10 wins in a tournament for 3rd time in career after 2021 Doha (d. No. 4 Thiem, No. 8 Rublev) and 2022 ATP Cup (d. No. 8 Ruud, No. 9 Hurkacz) and at 37Y 2M, would become the second-oldest men's finalist at Queen's in Open Era
- With an all-Spanish match-up in semi-finals, it marks the second time in Open Era two Spaniards reach semi-finals of the same grass court event after Bautista Agut and Nadal at 2019 Wimbledon. It is also the second all-Spanish semi-final this season after Alcaraz defeated Davidovich Fokina in Monte-Carlo SF in April.
- No. 2 seed **Jack Draper** is the only British player left in the field, as he bids to reach his first ATP Tour final on home soil. He meets World No. 30 **Jiri Lehecka** and attempts to become 7th different British man to reach **HSBC Championships** final in Open Era and second youngest British finalist after Murray, 22, in 2009. 23-year-old is 27-3 vs. players ranked outside Top 20 since October last year, including 2 wins over Lehecka.
- Lehecka** looks for his 5th ATP Tour final, first above ATP 250 level to become second Czech finalist in Open Era after 1989 and 1990 champion Lendl. He jumped to No. 26 on [PIF ATP Live Rankings](#) and would pass Tsitsipas to No. 25, if he earns his first Top 10 win since upsetting No. 3 Alcaraz in Doha QF in February. He attempts to become 1st Czech man to reach tour-level grass court final since Berdych at 2010 Wimbledon.

Draper faced challenges in the first set, with a Forehand shot quality of 6.7 and a Backhand score of 7.7. However, in sets two and three, his Forehand improved to 7.9, and his Backhand significantly to a formidable 9.3, achieving 91% In and from defensive positions contributed to a 42% Steal score across the final two sets.

Jiri Lehecka | Age: 23 | World No. 30 | Career-High No. 22 | 2025: 23-12 (Brisbane Title) | Queen's: 4-1 (2025 SF)
 > Achieved career-high No. 22 in February 2025 after 8-0 start to year with Brisbane title and run to Aus. Open 4R.
 > Defeated No. 5 Rublev to reach 2nd ATP Tour SF at 2023 Doha and en route to 1st ATP Masters 1000 QF at 2024 Indian Wells before defeating No. 4 Medvedev via RET to reach 1st ATP Masters 1000 SF at 2024 Madrid.
 > In Australia, earned wins over No. 12 Norrie and No. 7 Auger-Aliassime en route to 2023 Australian Open QF and captured both ATP Tour titles at 2024 Adelaide and 2025 Brisbane.
 > Reached 1st ATP Tour SF at 2022 Rotterdam as Q after defeating No. 12 Shapovalov in 1R for 1st ATP Tour win.
 > Celebrated 21st birthday during 2022 Next Gen ATP Finals and finished as runner-up.
 > Former World No. 10 junior won 2019 Wimbledon boys' doubles title with countryman Foretek.

NOTE: Lehecka defeated Fearnley in QF to earn 100th tour-level win of career (100-78) and now looks for his 5th and biggest ATP Tour final (2-2), first outside hard courts. He is 7-18 vs. Top 10 (0-2 on grass), including wins this season over No. 10 Dimitrov en route to Brisbane title and No. 3 Alcaraz in Doha QF before losing to Draper in SF.

Jack Draper | Age: 23 | World No. 6 | Career-High No. 4 | 2025: 28-7 (Indian Wells Title) | Queen's: 8-3 (2025 SF)
 > In 2022, broke into Top 200 in February, Top 100 in June and Top 50 in September, before achieving career-high No. 4 in June 2025, joining Nadal as only left-handers to break inside Top 5 of PIF ATP Rankings this century.
 > Became ATP Masters 1000 champion at 2025 Indian Wells, defeating Rune in 1st ATP Masters 1000 or Grand Slam final between players born in 2000s and reached 1st ATP Tour final on clay at 2025 Madrid.

- > Advanced to 2024 US Open SF without losing a set, becoming 4th British man in semi-finals of that event in Open Era, following Rusedski (1997), Henman (2004) and Murray (2008, 2011-12).
- > Captured 1st ATP Tour title by defeating 2-time champion Berrettini in 2024 Stuttgart final and earned biggest win of career over No. 2 Alcaraz at Queen's Club 2R in back-to-back weeks.
- > Ended junior career by achieving career-high No. 7 and reaching 2018 Wimbledon boys' singles final (d. Mejia 7-6 6-7 19-17 in SF).

NOTE: Draper seeks his 8th ATP Tour final (3-4), second on grass after winning Stuttgart title last year, fourth of 2025 (Doha, Indian Wells, Madrid) and first on home soil. By reaching this week's semi-final, he guaranteed return to career-high No. 4 on Monday and securing Top-4 seed at Wimbledon.

Carlos Alcaraz | Age: 22 | World No. 2 | Career-High No. 1 | 2025: 40-5 (4 Titles) | Queen's: 9-1 (2023 Title)

- > Youngest and first teenage World No. 1 and year-end No. 1 in PIF ATP Rankings history (since 1973), making record rise from No. 32 at end of 2021 to No. 1 at age 19 in September 2022, earning total of 36 weeks.
- > Beat Ruud in 2022 US Open final for No. 1 ranking, becoming youngest men's champion at US Open since Sampras, 19, in 1990 and at any Grand Slam event since Nadal, 19, at 2005 Roland Garros.
- > Became the youngest man to win a Grand Slam title on all three surfaces by winning 2024 Roland Garros title at age 21 and saved 3 championship points to defeat Sinner in longest final in history (5h29m) to defend the title in 2025.
- > Defeated 7-time champion Djokovic in 2023 and 2024 Wimbledon finals to be 2nd man in Open Era to win 1st four Grand Slam finals and became youngest Olympic men's finalist since 1904, earning silver medal at Paris Olympics.
- > Became youngest ATP 500 champion at 2022 Rio de Janeiro (since 2009) and 3rd-youngest ATP Masters 1000 champion at 2022 Miami (since 1990).
- > Youngest player to defeat both Nadal and Djokovic and 1st to do so at same clay-court event, beating them on back-to-back days en route to 2nd ATP Masters 1000 title at 2022 Madrid.

NOTE: Alcaraz is on a career-best 16-match winning streak after titles at ATP Masters 1000 Rome and Roland Garros and looks for 27th tour-level final of career (20-6) to play in the championship match for 5th consecutive event (also Monte-Carlo & Barcelona). 22-year-old aims to record 250th tour-level win of his career (249-61).

Fewest Matches Played to Earn 250 Tour-Level Wins in Open Era (Players that debuted in Open Era): In his 311th match, Alcaraz could be third fastest to reach 250 wins among players that began their career in Open Era.

Roberto Bautista Agut | Age: 37 | World No. 51 | Career-High No. 9 | 2025: 10-15 (Queen's SF) | Queen's: 5-2 ('25 SF)
 > Captured 12th ATP Tour title in Antwerp and 400th win of career in 2024 and ended 2019 at career-high No. 9.
 > Reached 1st Grand Slam QF at 2019 Australian Open and 1st Grand Slam SF at 2019 Wimbledon after entering season with 0-9 record in Grand Slam 4R matches.
 > Defeated No. 1 Djokovic in 2016 ATP Masters 1000 Shanghai SF, 2019 Doha SF and 2019 ATP Masters 1000 Miami 4R, as well as No. 1 Medvedev in 2022 Mallorca QF.
 > Went 4-1 at 2022 ATP Cup and 6-0 at 2020 ATP Cup to lead Spain to finals after helping his country win 2019 Davis Cup.
 > Played football for Villarreal C.F. until he was 14 years old.

NOTE: Bautista Agut saved 1 MP vs. Borges in 1R before earning wins over No. 17 Mensik and No. 9 Rune. He now seeks 24th ATP Tour final (12-11), first since winning Antwerp title last October and third on grass after 2014 's-Hertogenbosch and 2022 Mallorca. He is No. 43 on [PIF ATP Live Rankings](#) and would reach No. 39 with SF win.
