- One of two Americans in the semifinals, along with opponent Gauff
- Keys was the last player from the United States to win a title at Eastbourne, lifting the title in 2014 (her maiden title on the WTA tour)
- Last time two players from United States of America reached the semifinals at Eastbourne was 2003 (Rubin d. Capriati in SF; Rubin went on to win the title)
- Is currently ranked No.25; this time last year was ranked No.24
- During last year's European grass swing reached 3r at Eastbourne
- Is seeking her first final appearance of 2023



- Last time two players from United States of America reached the semifinals at Eastbourne was 2003 (Rubin d. Capriati in SF; Rubin went on to win the title)
- Is currently ranked No.7; this time last year was ranked No.12
- Is seeking first grass court finals appearance; with a win, would be the youngest player on Tour with a singles title on all three surfaces (Linz 2019 and Auckland 2023 on hard court, Parma 2021 on clay)
- During last year's European grass swing reached 3r at Wimbledon, SF at Berlin
- Has won 26 matches so far in 2023; she is currently tied for No.5 on tour for match wins, behind Iga Swiatek, Aryna Sabalenka, Elena Rybakina, Jessica Pegula

CAREER MILESTONES

- At 2022 Adelaide, won first title in over two years (d. Riske in F), followed by SF run at Australian Open - best Slam showing since 2018
- Other highlights last year were SF at Cincinnati and two further QF runs, including at Indian Wells
- In Grand Slam play, 2021 season was highlighted by R16 run at Wimbledon (l. Golubic). Finished campaign inside Top 100 for ninth successive year, but outside Top 20 for first time since 2014
- Ended 2020 ranked No.16, with best result being R-Up finish at Brisbane (l. Ka.Pliskova)
- Lifted biggest title of career during 2019 season at WTA 1000 Cincinnati (d. Kuznetsova in F); afterwards returned to Top 10 for first time since week of June 25, 2018
- Reached QF at 2019 Roland-Garros (l. Barty), one of three Americans to make last eight (also Anisimova and Stephens) - the first time since 2004 (Capriati, S.Williams and V.Williams)
- Reached first Grand Slam final in 2017 at US Open, losing out to Stephens in 10th all-American final in the Open Era. At 22, became the youngest Flushing Meadows finalist since 19-year-old Wozniacki lost to Clijsters in 2009
- Enjoyed first Top-10 year-end finish in 2016 (at No.8), as youngest player in Top 20
- Broke into Top 10 on June 20, 2016, becoming 118th player to reach the elite bracket since computer rankings were introduced. Also first American to make Top-10 debut since S.Williams in 1999
- Made WTA Finals debut at Singapore in 2016, going 1-2 in round-robin play
- Represented USA at 2016 Rio Olympics, reaching SF (lost Bronze medal match against Kvitova)
- Qualified for WTA Elite Trophy Zhuhai in 2015, 2018-19; went 1-1 in round-robin stage on all three appearances, with best result SF run in 2018 (withdrew before match vs. Muguruza w/left knee injury)
- Advanced to maiden major SF at 2015 Australian Open (l. eventual champion S.Williams); broke into Top 20 following conclusion of tournament, on February 2
- Was second-youngest player to win a WTA title in 2014, at Eastbourne (after Vekic at Kuala Lumpur); also, youngest American to win a title since V.King in October 2006 (17y 254d at Bangkok)
- Made Tour-level debut at 2009 Ponte Vedra Beach (as WC, d. Kudryavtseva); was seventh youngest player to win a WTA main draw match at 14y 48d and youngest since Hingis in 1994

- In 2022, reached maiden Grand Slam final at Roland-Garros (l. Swiatek); was the youngest major finalist since Sharapova won 2004 Wimbledon
- Made Top-10 debut on September 12, 2022, following QF run at US Open (l. Garcia)
- Highlight of 2021 campaign was completing singles-doubles title sweep at Parma; defeated Q.Wang in singles final and teamed up w/McNally to win doubles
- In 2021 also reached SF at Adelaide and Rome, while at the Slams made QF at Roland-Garros and R16 at Wimbledon
- Finished R-Up in doubles at 2021 US Open (w/McNally, l. Stosur/Zhang)
- First cracked the Top 50 on February 24, 2020 at No.49, following a R16 appearance at Australian Open to tie her career best Grand Slam result during run, defeated V.Williams in 1r and her first Top-5 opponent in No.4 Osaka in 3r (l. eventual champion Kenin in 3s)
- Enjoyed breakout season in 2019, highlighted by maiden WTA singles title at Linz (as lucky loser, d. Ostapenko in F) - earned her first Top-10 win en route to title over No.8 Bertens in QF
- At 15y 214d, her title run in Linz made her youngest to win a WTA tour-level title since Vaidisova (15y 177d) won Tashkent in 2004
- Also claimed maiden WTA doubles titles at Washington, DC (w/McNally, d. Sanchez/Stollar in F) and Luxembourg (w/McNally, d. Christian/Guarachi in F)
- By winning the doubles title at Washington, DC at 15y 144d, became the youngest player to win a doubles title since May 1995 (Hingis won Hamburg at 14y 219d)
- Reached R16 at 2019 Wimbledon on Grand Slam main draw debut defeating V.Williams in 1r (l. eventual champion Halep) - followed with 3r showing at US Open (as WC, l. Osaka)
- Made WTA main draw debut as a wildcard at 2019 Miami where she earned her first WTA main draw win over good friend McNally (l. Kasatkina in 2r)
- Made professional debut in May 2018 as a qualifier into the \$25K ITF/Osprey, FL-USA
- Member of US Billie Jean King Cup team in 2022
- Former Junior World No.1 (July 2018); won 2018
 Roland-Garros girls' title (d. McNally in F) and
 2018 US Open doubles title (w/McNally), while
 finished R-Up at 2017 US Open girls' event (l.
 Anisimova) becoming the youngest girls' singles
 finalist in tournament history at 13-years-old

- Best performances in 2022 came during grasscourt season when she reached QF at Birmingham (l. eventual champion Haddad Maia) and then SF at Eastbourne (l. Ostapenko)
- Defeated three Top-20 players to lift most prestigious title of her career at 2021 Montreal (d. No.6 Ka.Pliskova in F)
- In 2021 also advanced to SF at Eastbourne (d. No.4 Sabalenka and No.10 Ka.Pliskova, l. Kontaveit via ret. w/left thigh injury) and Tenerife (l. Osorio). Reached QFs at Olympics and Lyon
- During a disrupted 2020, reached SF at Palermo and QF at Lyon, finishing the year at No.76
- In 2019, reached seventh and eighth singles finals of her career, posting R-Up finishes at Washington DC (l. Pegula) and the Bronx (l. Linette)

- Broke back into Top 50 in early 2021, after lifting first titles since 2018, at the Phillip Island Trophy in Melbourne (d. Bouzkova in F) and then St. Petersburg (d. Gasparyan in F)
