CLUB HEALTH & VOLUNTEER ENGAGEMENT QUARTER 4 2023



BACKGROUND AND SURVEY CONTENT

- In previous years, separate, monthly surveys have been issued to monitor club health (among club main contacts) and volunteers.
- From 2023, these two surveys have been combined into one single questionnaire, which is issued quarterly to all volunteers (50% of volunteers per wave)
- Each survey covers
 - Volunteer engagement metrics
 - Club health metrics (among committee members who say they have sufficient knowledge to answer these)
 - A "hot topic" module in November 2023, this covered two areas, safeguarding, and junior competition.
- Almost 900 volunteers completed some or all of this survey wave, a response rate of c15%, providing a broad cross-section of volunteer viewpoints



HEADLINE MEASURES

CLUBS & VOLUNTEERS

As clubs make up a such huge part of the tennis landscape, it's important for us to understand what's happening in them, both in terms of their current health, as well as how they feel about their future.

We have been surveying clubs and volunteers over the last 3 years, which has helped us develop the venue support toolkit, housing practical tools and resources linked to all aspects of running a successful club.

The following slides provide an overview of what volunteers said about their club health, as well as some further information about their experience as a volunteer.

HEALTH DIFFERENCES BY REGION ARE RELATIVELY NARROW, THOUGH THROUGHOUT THIS YEAR, CLUBS IN THE SOUTH-EAST HAVE TENDED TO BE MOST POSITIVE AND THOSE IN THE MIDLANDS LEAST POSITIVE. THE SMALLEST CLUBS CONSISTENTLY RATE THEMSELVES AS LESS HEALTHY THAN THOSE WITH 4+ COURTS



WHERE DO YOU GO?


We offer support to clubs and volunteers in a couple of ways:

Contact and Resources Used for Club (Committee Members, all GB)




How satisfied are you with the information and support that your club has received from each of the following? All who used each source (Nov 125 - 484)

For this quarters deep dive we focussed on your views and delivery of junior competition. We wanted to understand what works well and the challenges around delivering junior competition


HOT TOPIC FINDINGS

2/3 OF SURVEY RESPONDENTS SAID THEIR CLUB RAN SOME JUNIOR COMPETITION, AND HALF DO THIS AT LEAST ONCE A QUARTER




How frequently does your venue currently offer competitive opportunities for junior members? This includes formal competition but also informal competition e.g. at the end of coaching sessions.

WHY DO SOME CLUBS OFFER NO JUNIOR COMPETITION?

Not enough / no junior members

Mentions of volunteers / organising task We don't have enough juniors to make teams so can't compete against other clubs. We don't know what opportunities are out there for friendly matches/informal comps. We are only a small club with just a few juniors in each category

Requires lot of extra work for already very busy people pressed for time as very few volunteers. Haven't been able to set up coaching partly due to fees that would be paid to LTA for having a coach? If that is correct as the club can't afford it .

We have no coach to drum up junior members. We were a venue for some junior events but that is all. The village school is strangely disinterested - probably has no resources for teaching sports

Because we only have 2 courts, and they are in demand for members. As an R1 I would love to hold some junior comps but just not feasible to take up court space.



WHAT WORKS WELL FOR YOUR CLUB?

Mentions of... The dynamism and enthusiasm of the club coach who organises the frequent competitions. In addition to personally encouraging the juniors to become involved, regardless of their standard, he posts adverts for the competitions in the clubhouse. 33% The coach / coaching They have small competitions at the end of their coaching sessions - more fun 15% Leagues / ladders games but with a competitive edge - King/Queen of the Court for example. (Coaching) sessions / In addition to an annual junior open tournament and club closed there is weekly 13% supervised competitive play for juniors supervised by a club coach that is funded by lessons the club at no charge to junior members. 10% **Fun / enjoyment** The junior events put on by the club with the coach running them are great fun. Events run with adult competitions on the same day are great as this encourages families to participate and support each other. This is particularly good for the club championship day.

WHAT CHALLENGES DOES YOUR CLUB FACE?

Mentions of...

18%	The coach / coaching	We don't current run Matchplay or Team Challenge at the club. I think the coaches need to be encouraged to do this but there is currently nothing in it for the coaches, as they already have a Programme set up.
18%	Court time or availability	Lack of time from the junior coaches to organise (they prioritise better paying adult coaching), overt displeasure from older adult members towards events with many children at the club. Court time at weekends is extremely limited (and therefore would involve depriving regular members of opportunities to play)
18%	Volunteers / support to organise	The biggest challenge is having people in place to help run junior competition. Our club coach could do with more support from another volunteer, so more competitive opportunities can be organised and delivered.
18%	Lack of junior members / entrants / girls	Same old story - they get to secondary school and the numbers tend to fade away as other interests take over. Especially true of teenage girls.




Whether Club Has a Competition Organiser

THE COMPETITION ORGANISER ROLE TENDS TO BE TAKEN ON BY THE COACH


Who is the competition organiser (All clubs with an organiser)




Competitive Opportunities Provided for Juniors

VOLUNTEERS CONSIDER THAT PARENTS ARE REASONABLY WELL INFORMED ABOUT UPCOMING COMPETITIONS


How well informed parents are about competition



WHAT MAKES THE STRUCTURE HARD TO UNDERSTAND?

What makes the current structure hard to understand (All saying not very / not at all clear and easy to understand)

I have little idea where to look to find it, when I have don't understand it and am unable to work out whether tournaments are the correct level for our players to enter.


Almost impossible for club junior players, even strong ones, to transfer over to becoming regular "competition players". Both due to lack of commitment and time from players & parents, and lack of awareness from LTA PR. The poster formerly sent out to clubs with details of all upcoming junior competitions was perfect and easy to signpost players to local tournaments, but now it's too hard to find online and not promoted widely enough.

I'm a junior chair for my tennis club and organise the teams and competitions, I did not realise there were any LTA resources available to help me with this. Where can I find them?

There are a lot of difference products and the names have changed over the years, so the branding isn't clear especially for volunteers who aren't immersed in this world like players and parents have to be. The LTA could improve the comms by making it player-centric instead of product-centric.

Agreement with Statements – Junior Competition




How far do you agree or disagree with the following statements about junior competition? All clubs who offer competitions (454)

DIRECT FOLLOW UP

Based on your responses, and where you have given permission, a member of the LTA Regional Team, Tennis Scotland or Tennis Wales may follow up with your club in the next few weeks.

Each region has an LTA Head of Region or Head of Participation in Scotland and Wales, and a team including Participation Development Partners (PDPs), and specialists to support you in areas such as workforce, competition, disability, community and safeguarding.

As well as support you and you club directly, these field based teams also set up network meetings and host webinars on key topics around club management.


