Centre Court – Match 1

Jessica Bouzas Maneiro (WR48 – ESP) v [2] Madison Keys (WR27 – USA)

Head to Head: First meeting

JESSICA BOUZAS MANEIRO

- Defeated Alicia Dudeney [60 63](#) in R1.
- Main draw debut at Eastbourne – fell to Heather Watson in qualifying last year.
- No Spanish woman has won Eastbourne title. Arantxa Sanchez Vicario (1991, 1997, 1998), Conchita Martinez (2003) and Magui Serna (2001) have all been finalists.
- Bids to reach 7th WTA Tour QF, 3rd of 2026 (would equal most ever in a season), and 2nd on grass. Also bids to reach QF in back-to-back WTA Tour events for 1st time.
- QF at Nottingham last week, falling to eventual finalist Emma Navarro – best result on grass.
- Bids to become 1st Spanish player to reach multiple WTA Tour QF's on grass in same season since Muguruza in 2017.
- Bids to become 6th Spanish woman to reach Eastbourne QF, and 1st since Maria Jose Martinez Sanchez in 2010. Would also be the youngest Spanish woman to reach Eastbourne QF since Serna in 2001.
- Reached R4 at Wimbledon last year – best result at a Grand Slam. Defeated defending champion and then World No. 6 Marketa Vondrousova at Wimbledon in 2024.
- Achieved a career-high ranking of No. 40 in August 2025. Currently Spain's No. 2, behind Cristina Bucsa.
- Lost 8 of last 9 matches against players ranked as high as No. 27 Keys, with only victory during this period coming against No. 4 Coco Gauff at United Cup this year.
- Has a 2-1 win-loss record against Grand Slam champions on grass, defeating Vondrousova at Wimbledon in 2024 and Sofia Kenin at Wimbledon last year. Fell to Barbora Krejickova at Wimbledon in 2024.

MADISON KEYS

- Defeated Talia Gibson [64 64](#) in R1.
- 6th main draw appearance at Eastbourne. Two-time champion. In 2014, as a 19-year-old, defeated Angelique Kerber in the final, and in 2023 defeated Daria Kasatkina in the final. SF in last appearance here (2024), falling to Leylah Fernandez.
- One of 8 women to win multiple Eastbourne titles, after Martina Navratilova (11), Chris Evert (3), Tracy Austin (2), Justine Henin (2), Karolina Pliskova (2), Chanda Rubin (2) and Caroline Wozniacki (2).
- Has a 13-3 win-loss record in main draw matches at Eastbourne.
- Bids to reach 61st WTA Tour QF, 5th of 2026, and 11th on grass.
- Bids to reach 4th Eastbourne QF – amongst American women only Martina Navratilova (12 representing America), Chris Evert (6), Mary Joe Fernandez (6) and Chanda Rubin (5) would have reached more. Karolina Pliskova, Daria Kasatkina and Jelena Ostapenko reached most QF's amongst active players (4 – Ostapenko could reach 5th today).
- Bids to become the oldest American woman to reach Eastbourne QF since Lori McNeil in 1995.
- Won Australian Open title last year – maiden Grand Slam title. It was her 46th major appearance – only Flavia Pennetta (49 major appearances to win 2015 US Open) and Marion Bartoli (47 major appearances to win 2013 Wimbledon) taken longer to claim 1st Grand Slam title. Won 10 WTA Tour titles, including 3 on grass (2014, 2023 Eastbourne and 2016 Birmingham).
- Last WTA Tour title (and final) was at 2025 Australian Open.
- Best performance at Wimbledon are two QF's (2015, 2023).
- Achieved career-high ranking of No. 5 in February 2025, when cracked top 10 for 1st time since August 2019. Currently USA's No. 6.
- 6-0 win-loss record in main draw matches at Eastbourne against players ranked as high as No. 48 Bouzas Maneiro.

Centre Court – Match 2

[3] Jelena Ostapenko (WR35 – LAT) v Panna Udvardy (WR71 – HUN)

Head to Head: First meeting

JELENA OSTAPENKO

- Defeated Britain's Francesca Jones [62 62](#) in R1.
- 10th appearance at Eastbourne (played in every edition since 2016). Champion in 2021, defeating Anett Kontaveit in final, and runner-up in 2022, falling to Petra Kvitova in final.
- One of 4 former Eastbourne champions in draw (Joint, Kasatkina, Keys). One of 22 women to reach multiple finals here.
- Has a 20-8 win-loss record at Eastbourne.
- Lost at this stage in last 2 years here, against Katie Boulter in 2024 and Alexandra Eala last year.
- Bids to reach 50th WTA Tour QF, 4th of 2026 (only reached 2 last year), and 11th on grass.
- Bids to reach 5th QF at Eastbourne, which would be a new record amongst active players – currently level on 4 with Karolina Pliskova and Daria Kasatkina (Madison Keys can also reach 4th QF today).
- Won 9 WTA Tour titles, including 2 on grass (at Eastbourne in 2021 and at Birmingham in 2023).
- 2017 Roland Garros champion. Best result at Wimbledon is SF in 2018, falling to eventual champion Angelique Kerber.
- Achieved a career-high ranking of No. 5 in March 2018.

PANNA UDVARDY

- Defeated compatriot Anna Bondar [76\(4\) 32 ret.](#) in R1.
- 2nd main draw appearance at Eastbourne – fell in R1 in 2022.
- Bids to reach 6th WTA Tour QF, 3rd of 2026 (which would be a new personal record for most QF's in a season), and 1st ever on grass.
- Bids to become 1st Hungarian, man or woman, to reach Eastbourne QF.
- Bids to become just 2nd Hungarian to reach WTA Tour QF on grass since 2009, after Dalma Galfi at s'Hertogenbosch (SF) in 2024.
- Reached maiden WTA Tour final this year, at Bogota on clay, falling to Marie Bouzkova (just 2nd Hungarian to reach a WTA Tour final since 2018, after Bondar at Hamburg last year). Also reached SF at Rabat on clay last month.
- Won 12 main draw matches on WTA Tour this year – easily her most ever in a season.
- Won just 3 WTA main draw matches on grass in entire career (one at Wimbledon in 2022, and two this month, at s'Hertogenbosch and at Eastbourne), so bids to win back-to-back WTA Tour main draw matches on grass for 1st time.
- Won just one main draw match at the Grand Slams – it came at Wimbledon in 2022. Lost in qualifying at Wimbledon last year when ranked No. 150 – won't have to qualify this year.
- Achieved a career-high ranking of No. 59 last month. Currently Hungary's No. 1.
- Has a 2-16 win-loss record against top 50 players, defeating No. 48 Tatjana Maria at Osaka in 2023 and No. 17 Ekaterina Alexandrova at s'Hertogenbosch earlier this month, so bids to win back-to-back matches against top 50 players for 1st time.
