HSBC CHAMPIONSHIPS TALKING POINTS

- 55th Open Era edition of **HSBC Championships** is headlined by World No. 6 and 2023 runner-up **Alex de Minaur**, who leads all players in ATP 500 wins (57) since the start of 2023 season and is 9-3 at ATP 500 level in 2026, highlighted by Rotterdam title. 27-year-old began his grass season by advancing to 's-Hertogenbosch final and will attempt to become the first Australian champion at this event since Hewitt in 2006.
- No. 8 seed **Tommy Paul** and **Marin Cilic** are the only former champions in the field, as 2024 champion Paul aims to extend his 5-match winning streak at the **Queen's Club** after being unable to defend his title last year due to an abdominal issue, while Cilic, who won in 2012 and 2018, bids to be the seventh man to win 3 titles at this event in Open Era, joining Murray (5), Becker (4), Hewitt (4), McEnroe (4), Roddick (4) and Connors (3).
- World No. 29 **Cameron Norrie** leads 5 Brits in the main draw, as the only Briton ranked inside Top 100 on PIF ATP Rankings makes his ninth consecutive appearance at the event, highlighted by run to 2021 final, losing to Berrettini. He is joined by wildcards **Arthur Fery**, **Jack Pinnington Jones** and **Toby Samuel**, all making their main draw debut at the **Queen's Club**, while qualifier **Harry Wendelken** makes his ATP Tour debut.
- 19-year-old and No. 5 seed **Rafael Jodar** went 19-4 on clay this season, highlighted by 1st ATP Tour title in Marrakech and 1st Grand Slam QF at Roland Garros and now plays in his first professional tournament on grass, after posting 9-1 grass record in juniors. 20-year-old and No. 3 seed **Jakub Mensik** enters the event after reaching his 1st Grand Slam SF at Roland Garros, while his countryman **Jiri Lehecka** returns as the No. 2 seed after playing in last year's championship match at the Queen's Club, losing to Alcaraz in 3 sets.

Botic van de Zandschulp (NED) vs [Q] Harry Wendelken (GBR) First Meeting

Botic van de Zandschulp | Age: 30 | World No. 56 | Career-High No. 22 | 2026: 12-11 (Bucharest SF) | Event: 3-2 ('22 SF)
> Achieved new career-high ranking 14 times in 2022, peaking at No. 22 in August and ending 2nd straight season as No. 1 Dutchman.

> At 2021 US Open, became 3rd men's qualifier to reach US Open QF in Open Era, 1st Dutchman to reach Grand Slam QF since 2004, and only player to take a set off eventual champion Medvedev.

> In 2024, posted upsets over No. 3 Alcaraz in US Open 2R for biggest win of career and Nadal in Davis Cup Finals to end former World No. 1's career and help Netherlands advance to 1st Davis Cup final in history (since 1900).

> In Munich, upset No. 7 Ruud en route to 1st ATP Tour final in 2022 and No. 10 Fritz to reach 2nd final in 2023, before squandering 4 championship points in 2023 final and losing to Rune on both occasions.

> Went 11-1 in Grand Slam qualifying matches in 2021, qualifying at Australian Open, Roland Garros and US Open, while entering Wimbledon as LL (l. to Trungelliti in Q3).

NOTE: van de Zandschulp is making his third main draw appearance at Queen's Club and earned all 3 wins at the event en route to 2022 semi-finals, defeating Q Jubb, No. 22 Dimitrov and No. 44 Davidovich Fokina. He aims to record his first grass win of the season after losing to countryman Griekspoor in 's-Hertogenbosch 1R last week.

Harry Wendelken | Age: 24 | World No. 224 | Career-High No. 223 | 2026: 0-0 (3 CH Finals) | Queen's: 0-0 (Debut)

> Former Top-50 junior earned 1st ranking point in 2019, broke into Top 500 in 2023, achieving career-high No. 223 in April 2026 after advancing to back-to-back Challenger finals in Miyazaki and Wuning 1.

> Qualified for ATP Tour debut at 2026 London / Queen's Club after previously losing in Grand Slam qualifying of 2023 Wimbledon and 2026 Roland Garros.

> Owns 28-22 Challenger record (1-3 in finals), capturing 1st title at 2025 Hersonissos 6 as a lucky loser, and 121-104 on ITF World Tennis Tour (5-3 in finals), winning most recent title at 2026 M25 Sheffield.

> Peaked at No. 34 in juniors in 2019, highlighted by run to 2018 Wimbledon boys' doubles semi-final w/Story.

NOTE: Wendelken is making his ATP Tour debut after defeating Australians Walton in Q1 and Vukic in Q2 to qualify. He is the first Brit to qualify at this event since Jubb in 2022 (l. to van de Zandschulp in 1R) and could become the first British man to reach Queen's Club 2R after coming from qualifying since Delgado and Flanagan in 2004.

Tommy Paul | Age: 29 | World No. 28 | Career-High No. 8 | 2026: 26-11 (Houston Title) | Queen's: 7-2 (2024 Title)
 > Former World No. 3 junior achieved career-high No. 8 in June 2025 after becoming first American man since Agassi in 2003 to reach both Australian Open and Roland Garros QFs in a single season.
 > At 2023 Australian Open, became 1st American men's semi-finalist of that event since Roddick in 2009.
 > Earned 7 wins over Top-5, including biggest win of career over No. 1 Alcaraz to reach 1st ATP Masters 1000 SF at 2023 Toronto.
 > Defeated junior rivals Fritz and Tiafoe en route to 1st ATP Tour final and title at 2021 Stockholm.
 > Earned personal-best 45 wins during 2024 season, highlighted by titles in Dallas, London/Queen's Club and Stockholm and advanced to ATP Masters 1000 SFs in Indian Wells and Rome.
 > Saved 3 championship points to defeat Burruchaga in 2026 Houston final to complete the set of ATP Tour titles on all three surfaces and 7 MP vs. Etcheverry en route to 2026 Hamburg final.
 > Won 2015 Roland Garros boys' singles title (d. Fritz), advanced to 2015 Roland Garros boys' doubles final w/Blumberg and reached 2015 US Open boys' singles final (l. to Fritz).

NOTE: Paul is on a 5-match winning streak at the event after winning the biggest title of his career at this venue two years ago before pulling out last year due to abdominal injury. He is one of two former champions in the draw (also Cilic) and plays in his 1st match on grass this season after withdrawing from Stuttgart last week due to neck issue.

Zachary Svajda | Age: 23 | World No. 69 | Career-High No. 62 | 2026: 6-8 (Roland Garros 4R) | Queen's: 0-0 (Debut)
 > Secured 1st ranking point at age 15 in 2018, broke into Top 200 in September 2023 and Top 100 in February 2026, achieving career-high No. 62 in June 2026 after advancing to Roland Garros 4R.
 > Defeated Cecchinato for 1st tour-level win at 2021 US Open as 18-year-old WC and Piros at 2025 US Open as Q, before taking a set off 4-time champion Djokovic in 2R.
 > Squandered 2-set lead vs. Lorenzi in tour-level debut at 2019 US Open as 16-year-old WC, becoming youngest player to compete at event since Young, 16, in 2005.
 > Owns 81-55 Challenger record (7-1 in finals), defeating future-Top 10 player Shelton for 1st Challenger title at 2022 Tiburon and former-Top 20 player Korda for most recent title at 2026 San Diego.
 > Earned US Open WCs by winning 2019 and 2021 USTA Boys' 18s National Championships.
 > Lost to 2018 USTA Boys' 18s champion Brooksby in 2021 Cleveland Challenger 1R and 2017 USTA Boys' 18s champion Kypson in 2021 Wichita ITF QF.

NOTE: Svajda seeks first tour-level win on grass courts in his second match on the surface (l. to Paire in 2024 Newport 1R). 23-year-old is 2-11 vs. Top 30, earning both wins over F. Cerundolo as No. 29 at 2024 Winston-Salem and as No. 26 in Roland Garros 3R in his most recent event. One of two lucky losers in the draw (also Kovacevic).

[WC] Jack Pinnington Jones (GBR) vs Denis Shapovalov (CAN) First Meeting

Jack Pinnington Jones | Age: 23 | World No. 147 | Career-High No. 132 | 2026: 2-2 (Dallas QF) | Queen's: 0-0
 > Achieved career-high No. 132 in May 2026 soon after defeating No. 20 Cobolli for biggest win of career en route to his 1st ATP Tour QF in Dallas as No. 181-ranked qualifier.
 > Made his ATP Tour debut at 2025 Eastbourne as WC, losing to Borges in 1R and made Grand Slam main draw debut at 2025 Wimbledon, defeating Etcheverry in 1R.
 > Boasts 37-26 Challenger record (2-2 in finals), defeating countryman and former World No. 14 Edmund to win 1st title at 2025 Nottingham-3 and did not drop a set en route to 2nd title at 2025 Winston-Salem.
 > Wimbledon boys' singles quarter-finalist in 2021 peaked at No. 6 in the junior rankings, before playing college tennis for Texas Christian University, former team of his countrymen Norrie and Fearnley.

NOTE: Pinnington Jones seeks second Top 50 win of the season after defeating No. 20 Cobolli en route to 1st ATP Tour QF in Dallas. 23-year-old aims to record second tour-level win on grass after defeating No. 53 Etcheverry in Wimbledon 1R last year (l. to Cobolli in 2R).

Denis Shapovalov | Age: 27 | World No. 41 | Career-High No. 10 | 2026: 8-12 (Dallas SF) | Queen's: 4-5 (2021 SF)
 > After becoming 1st Canadian US Open men's singles quarter-finalist in 2020, joined Raonic as 2nd Canadian man in history to break into Top 10.
 > Defeated 2-time champion Murray and earned 5-set wins over Kohlschreiber and Khachanov en route to 1st Grand Slam SF at 2021 Wimbledon.
 > Reached 2019 Paris final and 4 other ATP Masters 1000 SFs, including 2017 Montreal, where he upset No. 2 Nadal and became youngest semi-finalist in series history at age 18 (since 1990).
 > Won 3 of his 4 ATP Tour titles indoors, at 2019 Stockholm, 2024 Belgrade and 2025 Dallas, where he defeated 3 Top 10 players en route to title (No. 4 Fritz in 2R, No. 9 Paul in SF and No. 5 Ruud in final).
 > Ended junior career with 2016 Wimbledon boys' singles title, then broke into Top 50 of PIF ATP Rankings less than 15 months later.

NOTE: Shapovalov looks for first win since defeating Griekspoor and Marozsan to reach Munich QF in April, 0-5 since, including loss to Cilic in 's-Hertogenbosch 1R last week. 27-year-old made his tournament debut in 2017 as No. 193-ranked qualifier, defeating Edmund in 1R and seeks first win at the event since his run to 2021 semi-finals.

G. Mpetshi Perricard | Age: 22 | World No. 87 | Career-High No. 29 | 2026: 8-13 (3 QFs) | Queen's: 1-2 (2024 2R)
 > Began 2024 season as No. 205 and broke into Top 100 in May, Top 50 in July and achieved career-high No. 29 in February 2025.
 > Recorded 6-1 start to career vs. Top 20 opponents, including wins over former champion No. 19 Auger-Aliassime and No. 14 Rune to win 2024 Basel title without dropping serve all tournament (60 of 60 service games won).
 > Saved a championship point to win 1st ATP Tour title in his hometown of Lyon in 2024 as No. 117-ranked WC.
 > Entered 2024 Wimbledon as LL, defeating No. 21 Korda in 1R for 1st Grand Slam main draw win en route to becoming 1st lucky loser to reach Wimbledon 4R since Norman in 1995.
 > Owns 56-34 Challenger record (5-0 in finals), winning titles at 2023 Leon, 2024 Nottingham, 2024 Cuernavaca, 2024 Acapulco and 2025 Bordeaux.
 > Peaked at No. 4 in junior rankings during 2021 season, after advancing to 2021 Roland Garros boys' singles SF (l. to Fils) and winning the boys' doubles title w/Fils.

NOTE: Mpetshi Perricard seeks third Top 50 win of the season after defeating No. 20 Paul in Brisbane 1R and No. 28 Norrie in Auckland 2R in first two weeks of the season (0-8 since). He is on a 14-match winning streak vs. left-handers across all levels (6-0 on tour-level) since losing to Shimizu in Chicago Challenger SF in July 2023.

Corentin Moutet | Age: 27 | World No. 36 | Career-High No. 30 | 2026: 6-13 (Marrakech QF) | Queen's: 1-1 ('25 2R)
 > Former Top-10 junior ended 2022 at No. 51, breaking inside Top 50 in July 2025 and achieving career-high No. 30 in April 2026 after earning personal-best 31 wins in 2025, highlighted by finals in Mallorca and Almaty.
 > Reached 1st ATP Tour final as 20-year-old at 2020 Doha, becoming youngest French finalist on tour since Gasquet, 20, at 2006 Lyon.
 > Beat former champion Wawrinka en route to 2022 US Open 4R, becoming 1st men's lucky loser on record to reach US Open 4R and advanced to 4R of 2024 Roland Garros and 3R of 2024 Paris Olympics.
 > Defeated future World No. 3 Tsitsipas for 1st Challenger title at 2017 Brest as 18-year-old WC.
